JR. chooses 3 priorities weekly.</i></p> <p>b. Summary of local initiatives, events and issues requested.</p> <p><i>Threat, Harm and Risk meetings – as above</i></p> <p><i>Operation Citadel – now less burglaries</i></p> <p><i>ASB – Section 34 – offenders can’t go back into same area</i></p> <p>c. OPCC website links set out local priorities in our area (i.e. Lichfield District is 50% parking/ 50% youths congregating etc.) based on a “consultation with the community”. When was this consultation completed? What form did the community consultation take - were the views of the SNP solicited or taken into account in setting these priorities?</p> <p><i>Consultation was conducted in various ways in the community using the Citizen Focussed Toolkit.</i></p> <p>d. What do the percentage figures mean?</p> <p><i>50% of the people consulted thought that parking was a priority and 50% thought that congregating was a priority.</i></p> <p><i>A scrutiny could be done on this method of consultation</i></p> <p>e. Can the LSNP help in showing these local priorities better and how to describe it better way such as Leicester report their priorities?</p> <p><i>Jo to investigate</i></p> <p>f. 5	<p>LPT PERFORMANCE MATTERS</p> <p>Mental Health & Vulnerability</p> <p>Richard, Diane and Niamh to be part of working group.</p> <p>Officers take part in training as per the national guidelines using electronic ‘open university’ method. HMIC assess all the systems in place regarding training. Last year HMIC deemed that police work around Domestic Violence required improvement. This resulted in delivery of more training. Every officer attended a day session delivered by medical experts.</p>	

<p>A Multi Agency Safeguarding Hub (MASH) assess every job, every day.</p> <p>Police attend the weekly Community Partnership Vulnerability Hub every Thursday where partnership organisations meet to discuss support for vulnerable people including people with potential mental health illness.</p> <p>The triage system is in place that includes a Mental Health Nurse is available daily from 3pm to 2am. There is a system in place for all the NHS systems for checks to be made by police staff to look for any possible links to Mental Health so that the best support can be sought. Part funding for the triage system comes from the PCC. It is a system unique to Staffordshire.</p> <p>Investigation and attempts to obtain data on subject have not enabled LSNP to distil a unique scrutiny on issues from mental health or vulnerable people, either victim or criminal are very interlinked and cross through many areas.</p> <p>A scrutiny is proposed to test the LPT training, processing, procedures, and interaction with other services by tracing a sample set of records concerning examples of mental health issues. Essentially looking backwards through the system.</p> <p>How to proceed - some suggestions could come from the Lichfield Hub meeting information, complaints, review of outcomes, or "136" records.</p> <p>VISIBILITY</p> <p>Visibility is measured by radio data, GPS tracks whereabouts of officers using a 5 minute window with a 5metre geo fence from the station. A scrutiny could be completed on reports from Jo to check accuracy of figures.</p> <p>Rape cases</p> <p>How does a recent order to review all rape cases affect LPT resources?</p> <p>The rape statistics re assessment will be completed by the CPS. 7	<p>SNP REPORT TO THE OPCC</p> <p>The LSNP are now in quite good shape, having a good number of new members, making our panel 9 strong. It appears the security vetting is being done, but frustratingly slowly. All panel members are now actively involved in investigatory work groups for our many topics, the aim to prioritise these and cover an initial local scrutiny. Scrutiny also depends on the required training, and the panel thinks this should be an OPCC priority.</p> <p>LSNP still feel the initial feedback from the OPCC has been a little confusing. Organisation and personnel changes are very confusing. LSNP are trying a new format that will evolve in future. Similar requests made to both the OPCC and LPT have shown lack of clarity where the answers to our questions lie. Recent requests raised at the Interim Meeting to the OPCC, referred us back to the LPT. Somewhat of a circular argument for us as the LPT had referred us to OPCC.</p> <p>We realise that the majority of SNP members are new and do not have clear picture of the LPT, necessitating a more generalized information gathering around the topics of interest.</p>	

	<p>Our intention is to lead to some useful interaction. More importantly will be some agenda changes, work group focus and expectations from everyone involved to generate scrutiny and support within our local policing area.</p> <p>This has changed the focus and required input from panel members and especially the LPT at the meetings. It is hoped that the OPCC direction and training end up with the correct level of information, questions and input to the meeting (Panel, LPT and OPCC). Our role is not just to question, but to also support LPT in understanding and interpreting priorities and information to and from the public in general or officially via the OPCC.</p> <p>We hope that the following information needs will be discussed, raising some questions of the LPT and the OPCC. We would like to expand the LPT's input on where they see our role is, not just in friendly critique/scrutiny, but also input useful to them. We think there should be 4 types of information gathering, from the OPCC and from the LPT together until data sources and all roles become clear. In main it is difficult for the panel to know who is best to provide this information.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Questions arising from LSNP workgroups on specific local policing issues. • Questions arising from LSNP as part of local scrutiny or background for local scrutiny. • Requests or info from LPT on any internal needs that we can support as independents. • Feedback on general policing issues and how, where or if they impinge on our LPT resources or priorities.
